INFORMATION ABOUT APPLYING FOR THE F-1 STUDENT VISA

How do I apply for the F-1 student visa?

The F-1 student visa may only be obtained by filing an application in person with a U.S. Embassy or Consulate in the country where you hold permanent residence. In order to be eligible for the F-1 student visa, you must present documentary evidence that will convince the consular officer that:

1. You have been accepted to a school for a full course of study.

Evidence: your Form I-20 A-B and Concordia acceptance letter.

2. You have sufficient funds to support your studies and living expenses for the full length of your program.

Evidence: the proof of your financial ability you presented with this application. That is:

Sponsor's Affidavit of support and supporting documentary evidence (originals, not photocopies).

3. You have the language proficiency to undertake the proposed program of study or that arrangements have been made by your school for you to obtain the required proficiency.

Evidence: TOEFL score and Form I-20 A-B. No TOEFL is needed for ESL students.

4. You fully intend to return to your home country after the completion of your studies. This means demonstrating that you have compelling ties that will cause you to return.

Evidence: if your family owns a business, take letters from the bank describing the business. If your family owns property, take the deed. If you have taken a leave from a job or have the prospect of a job offer, obtain a letter from the company stating that your job will be held until you return or that people with the education that you are seeking are in demand in your country. If you have family residing in your country, discuss your plan to frequently return home to see them.

Most visa denials are based on students not being able to convince the consular officer that they have sufficient ties to compel them to return home after completing their studies. If you have family members with U.S. permanent residence or citizenship, this may suggest that you plan to stay in the U.S. Embassies or consulates in countries where large numbers of people have immigrated to the U.S. require that the documentary evidence presented is *very* strong.

It is important that you plan carefully - most interviews with consular officers are less than three minutes long. Prepare documents proving your intention to return home. Discuss your future plans and how your education will prepare you for it. *Never lie*. Respond only to questions you are asked.

What should I do if my F-1 student visa application is denied?

If you were denied on the grounds explained in #4, there will be very little that you can do other than to reapply as soon as you have new, additional evidence to present.

What should I do if I have not received my form I-20 yet?

DO NOT ENTER THE U.S. WITH A TOURIST (B-1 OR B-2) VISA UNLESS IT IS ANNOTATED "PROSPECTIVE STUDENT."

If you already hold a valid tourist visa, take your letter of acceptance with all the other evidence required for applying for the F-1 visa (see above) to the U.S. EMBASSY to request that this notation be added. To enter the U.S. as a tourist when you plan to be a student is a serious violation of U.S. law.

Do not enter the U.S. without a visa (WT or WB status)

If you are from a country from where it is permitted to present a round-trip airline ticket for entry. You will only be able to stay in the U.S. 90 days and cannot change to F-1 status from within the country.

What you should know about entering the United States as an F-1 Student

The embassy will give you an envelope containing your Form I-20 A-B and financial documents to present to the Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officer at the U.S. port of entry. **When you arrive** at U.S. Immigration inspection, give your passport and the envelope from the embassy to the CPB officer who will review your documents, stamp the visa page of your passport and create a digital record of your entry into the United States (Form I-94) which can be accessed online: https://i94.cbp.dhs.gov/194/#/home

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL ABILITY

Instructions:

A. List all sources of your support for each year of your program of study in U.S. Dollars; any combination of sources is acceptable. The estimated annual budget is \$55,589. (2020-2021 academic year tuition and fees, room and board, health insurance and miscellaneous expenses).

A Sponsor may be a member of your family, a friend, or an organization. The attached Sponsor's Affidavit must be submitted for each sponsor you have. You may photocopy it for use by each of your sponsors. If you plan to live off campus with someone who will provide you with room and meals free of charge, that person must complete a sponsor's affidavit, with a cash value of **\$13,984**.

B. Provide the specified documentary evidence for each source of support you list. Evidence must be photocopies or scans of originals, and be less than six months old. You will present the original documents at your visa interview.

SPONSOR'S AFFIDAVIT OF FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Your Commitment: When you complete the Sponsor's Affidavit of Financial Support on this page, you are certifying to Concordia College and the U.S. Government that you can and will provide this student with a specific amount of money for each year of study. It is assumed that you have carefully considered the real costs of supporting the student's expenses while living and studying at Concordia. Do not expect that he/she will be able to find employment or other support after beginning his/her studies. Sponsors who fail to meet their stated commitment jeopardize the student's education and legal status in the U.S. and cause pain and suffering. This page must be completed and signed by all people who are helping to finance the student's education. If necessary, this page may be photocopied.

Instructions for Completing the Affidavit:

- Fill out the form on the bottom of this page completely. Please print or type.
- Promise to provide the actual amount that you intend and are able to give to the student.
- Sign the affidavit in the presence of a notary public in the U.S. or other licensed official in your country.
- The notary public or official must sign and put the official seal on the affidavit.
- Attach documentary evidence of financial ability. (See below)
- The affidavit and documentary evidence of financial ability must be in (or officially translated into) English.

Documentary Evidence of Financial Ability:

1. Documentary evidence of your financial ability to support a student may consist of:

A: Required:

Letter from an officer of a bank or other financial institution stating the date the account was opened, total amount
deposited for the past year, and present balance (in U.S. Dollars). Bank statements will not be accepted as sufficient
documentary evidence unless the account balance is very high. Bank statements saying that "enough" or "sufficient" funds
are available to support a student are not acceptable evidence;

B: Other supporting documents:

- Letter from your employer on business stationery stating your annual salary;
- Income tax receipts and forms.
- 2. Evidence must be photocopies or scans of originals, and be less than six months old. You will present the original documents at your visa interview

Your Commitment:

When you complete the Sponsor's Affidavit of Free Room and Meals below, you are certifying and swearing to Concordia College and a U.S. Government official that you can and will supply the student with free room and meals for each year of study at Concordia. Free room and meals are equivalent to \$13,984 in cash toward support of the student.

It is assumed that you have carefully considered the real costs of providing the student with a free room and all meals while studying at Concordia and do not expect that he/she will find employment or other support after beginning his/her studies. Sponsors who fail to meet their stated commitment, jeopardize the student's education and legal status in the U.S. and cause pain and suffering.

- 1. Fill out the form entitled Affidavit for Sponsors Providing Free Room and Meals completely. Please print or type.
- 2. Attach a photocopy of a lease or deed in your name, or a photocopy of income tax forms on which the house is reported.
- 3. The affidavit must be in (or officially translated into) English.
